

In Europe and the United States, there is absolutely no sense of compulsion, patience, or imposition on the SDGs.

The reason why they choose the SDGs lifestyle is because it's cool. Because it's comfortable. I feel that one of the major characteristics of Europe and the United States is that it is green as a result and SDGs as a result. It would be great if we could do it because we want to do it, rather than because we have to do it because our boss tells us to do it. I feel that the SDGs will take root in Japan in a natural way if such a form that naturally emerges becomes more and more widespread.

As a Japanese, I will continue to work on the SDGs. Please keep in mind that the SDGs are very important.

I realize that Japan has really beautiful words related to SDGs. "Mottainai", "Itadakimasu", "Gochisousama", and Sampo Yoshi. I believe that there is no country other than Japan that has such beautiful words and concepts.

I think the basis of the SDGs is the business of local production for local consumption. They are launching more and more businesses like shining stars to improve their hometowns, and a trading company like ours will connect them and disseminate them to the world. I think it would be great if we could collaborate like that.

I have often seen people say, "It's in fashion," or "We have to do it because it's a social trend," or "It's appealing," even from my perspective as someone involved in supporting data science and DX. I want to do something, but what should I do? "I don't have anything in particular that I want to do, and I'm consulted that I have to do it anyway."

I think that it's any entry point for tackling the SDGs is fine, and whether or not it goes well from that entry point depends on whether you can think about it in the long term and whether you can correctly define success and failure. I think there are some difficult aspects, such as the cost involved and the need to obtain the understanding of the employees, but in the medium to long term, there will be profits and the employees will be happy.

The definition of success, even in data science, can fail, or give up when data is scarce. However, knowing that this is not enough is also a success, and it is important to connect it to the next.

I don't know if a company has succeeded in appealing that it is working on the SDGs through a certain initiative, but I think it has succeeded in appealing the SDGs themselves to society as a whole. This is because the fact that large companies do such things has become the advertising power of the SDGs.

I believe that this will enable the younger generation and those who do not understand the SDGs well and want to learn more about them to think about the essence of the SDGs.

Now that I have reached a reasonable age, I am in a position to pass on various things to young people, and there are many people who do not know about various historical facts and the soap movement. For that reason, I would like to convey the idea of thinking scientifically.

Marina HATA

I hope that there will be more opportunities for young people to see what adults are doing, and for adults to see how young people are moving forward. I would like to increase the activities and momentum of young people from now on, so I would like everyone to do their best to aim for a sustainable society.





Answer: Mango Lake Biwa currently catches sweetfish and crucian carp for ERI (means fish corral), but around 1965, a certain type of fishing was prosperous. What kind of fishing is that?

Answer: Ikechogai (Hyriopsis schlegelii)

MC What are the current garbage issues in Japan and how can we reduce garbage in the future?

SAKANO In industrial waste, wood chips account for a very small proportion, about 3%. In the case of household waste, there are surprisingly many things that should returned to nature, and organic matter accounts for about 30% to 40%. The term "food loss" is being heard a lot these days, but I hope you can imagine that there are many things you can do, such as checking your refrigerator frequently so that you don't waste it.

MC Please tell us about changes in the ecosystem of Lake Biwa, recent trends, and initiatives related to Lake Biwa.

MIWA I feel that changes in the environment and society are having a major impact on the fishing industry. Recently, the water quality itself is getting better, but the ecosystem and creatures are strange. Therefore, efforts are being made to remove non-native aquatic plants. In terms of fisheries, the cycle of visiting Lake Biwa and eating fish from Lake Biwa has continued for a long time, so I think it is important for us to make effective use of local resources.

Online Discussion

Think about its with HAICHI and students



In Session 2, Mr. Haichi, an educational YouTube, and Mr. Azuma from Ritsumeikan Moriyama High School and Mr. Imanaka from Torahime High School held a roundtable discussion online. They talked about SDGs activities while looking back at the guiz.



HAICHI I watched the quiz, but I failed both questions. I didn't know about ERI (means fish corral). In fact, I learned that there is such a fishery, and there is a keyword that is kind to Lake Biwa. I watched it while feeling that it would become important to let people know that there are different ways to catch fish.

AZUMA Mr. HAICHI, do you have a goal among the SDGs that you want to solve the most?

HAICHI If I had to pick one, since I provide free educational videos on YouTube, number 4 is "Quality education for everyone", so if I were told that it would be the best, I think it would be there. If you let me be greedy, I can sympathize with all of them, and I feel positive, but there are two more, one is number 2, "Zero hunger". "Food" is a very important part of life. We can eat a proper meal every day. Hunger is not a keyword in Japan, but the number of poor households is increasing even in Japan, so I would like to solve the problem of hunger. The other one is number 5, "Let's achieve gender equality." This was originally a hot keyword for me, and I would like to stick to these three.

AZUMA Mr. HAICHI, what is important in solving social problems?

HAICHI When solving a big problem, unexpectedly, there are people who act individually and have their own thoughts, but individuals are "dots". But when you connect the dots, it becomes a line. If you connect more of them, it becomes a "face". The impact will be greater if everyone does it together, not as an individual, but as a community. Since the impact is great, it is absolutely necessary to have a flow that will lead to other things. I guess I'll need someone to coordinate the outside rather than the inside. If that's the case, I think it's very important for everyone to disseminate information.

IMANAKA Mr. HAICHI, who has posted various educational content, I would like to know about your thoughts on education.

HAICHI I think it would be nice if there were more "choices". But don't be mistaken, there will be more new "choices". New things look good. Glittering. But, for example, why do we learn mathematics? While thinking "Why?", there is definitely "learning". It's something that can't be lost, so there's value and meaning in existing things, but we also need new options. I'm working while thinking that it's important to increase the number of options while maintaining that balance.

Trying to work on various things freely, trying to create something new, or just trying to find something interesting, I get a lot of realizations that things are actually useful in some way, isn't it? Then, when I think about how to make it easier to create such a place of awareness, it is very important that there is a place for self-expression.

What I think about working on the Metaverse is that you can easily and reliably converse with people in distant areas. YO YAMAKAWA Ryukyu Univ., Faculty of Science Studen

Nowadays, the number of resort facilities in Okinawa is increasing, and the number of seas that cannot be entered freely is increasing year by year, and there are many places where fishing is prohibited, so you cannot freely catch shellfish and fish. People with bad manners will end up fishing even in places where it is prohibited, such as throwing garbage into the sea instead of taking it home, parking the car in a place where it should not be parked, and even if it is prohibited. Only those who keep good manners are losing. Instead of banning it, I think there must be another way.

In Northern Europe, there is a system called the right to enjoy nature, which allows you to freely enter and enjoy the forest even if you are not the owner of the forest.

If you ban it, the connection between the sea and the local people will decrease, and the opportunity to think about the sea will decrease. If you go into the sea more often, you will soon notice that the number of fish has decreased, or that you have only seen the same type of fish recently.

Sara HAYASE Torahime high school Student

I thought of the lens as a tool that can be used to get hints and solutions to solve problems and issues. There are several types of lenses; magnifying glass that has a strong meaning of "searching", a telescope that looks at values that are separate from yourself, lenses we wear on a daily basis like the glasses I am wearing now. By using these lenses properly, I can see what kind of meaning my words and actions, myself, and in my heart, or the activities of the committee have for society, and what kind of things I can do in the future. I think it will be an opportunity to reconsider.



Ms. Hayase's lens analogy is also interesting, and he has the idea that multiple viewpoints are important and that problems cannot be solved without various viewpoints. When we were little, we listened to the stories while wondering if we had received such an education.

I think young people are too busy these days. There is really no margin. I don't hang out at all, it's getting harder and harder to connect with people due to the covid 19, and it seems like it's only natural that we don't have drinking parties, so I think it's really serious. I think that what you are working on is originally a playful desire to solve a problem or to tackle a problem. Before you know it, it becomes a sense of duty, and it becomes like you're doing something because someone told you to do it, and it gets harder and harder. That's why I want you to be conscious of margins and play.

UEDA: When I asked Governor Mikazuki to write something out of the blue, he wrote this immediately. As the link between history and the future, between me and you, between myself and everyone, let's put love in the middle. For Shiga Pref., this middle "love" may be changed to "Lake Biwa". It is a thing where everyone is facing in that direction and connected.

UEDA: There is research that says that 80% of the development of a life story is determined by unexpected coincidences. Curiosity, adventurousness, optimism, flexibility, and continuity attract good coincidences.

On the other hand, we happen to be born in this era and we happen to be here. It's all a coincidence, but in order to participate here, I'm tuning in a little bit and I'm there. From now on, what should we do based on the seven hints given today, based on what we have heard from each other through this "Coincident" place? "Let's get along."

And the completed 7 rules —

- 1. Let's not start with a [prohibition]! (YAMAKAWA)
- 1. Look at it with different [lenses]! (HAYASE)
- 1. []Let's cherish the margins! (TAGUCHI)
- 1. Put [love] in the middle! (MIKAZUKI)
- 1. (Take chance on your side) Let's grow [happiness] by [chance]! (UEDA)

UEDA: By all means, let's all think about the eighth and lead to the achievement of the SDGs and the realization of great freedom. I would appreciate it if today was one of those opportunities, where happiness starts from being present.
